From the Board . . . Going Green; get on the bandwagon and “Green up” your office and Company by Patrick Scher – Secretary CHWMS, ECC Science and Engineering Manager

It seems everywhere you look or read today, there is another article on going green or sustainability. At this month's CHWMS Board meeting, we were discussing potential October Workshop topics, and several members described how inundated we were all becoming with Green subjects. Obama's Green agenda, global warming, carbon trading, the green job market, biofuels, etc. – you can not pick up and environmental trade journal, a magazine or the newspaper, or log onto a news site without reading something “green”. Well “good” - I say. *We all need to wake up and wise up, and go green as hard and as fast as we can!*

For example, when you read the amount of plastic that is in our oceans, and how long it takes for this to degrade, it makes me wonder what type of world we are leaving for our kids. David de Rothschild built a boat out of plastic bottles and is sailing from San Francisco to Sydney to publicize awareness about the amount of [plastic that is floating in the world's oceans](#), much of it in massive garbage swills like the Great Pacific Garbage Patch, which according to the Algalita Marine Research Foundation, is about the size of [Texas](#) and contains 1 million tons of plastic. The Patch was discovered 10 years ago and since has doubled in size. Research has shown similar debris swills in the Atlantic Ocean. It takes about 1,000 years for plastics to fully degrade. (Good Morning America).

What are we going to do about this? What can we do? Well, I want to tell you about an initiative at my company, ECC, that started only in 2008, but has made an impact on our company, and I hope the consulting environmental industry. The ECC Green Team, EGT, has a mission statement: “The ECC Green Team is a grass-roots effort led by eco-minded ECC employee-owners striving to facilitate environmental sustainability, both on and off the job, by bringing knowledge, initiatives, resources, and encouragement to all of ECC, our clients, the extended ECC community, and beyond.” Put simply, the EGT, 12 members of the ECC family, facilitates going green for all of us at ECC. They accomplish this by completing initiatives and publishing a quarterly *News Flash*, letting ECC employee-owners know what and how we can improve the earth and our lives. The 2010 initiatives for the EGT are:

- 1) Researching and implementing procedures to reduce and offset the number of flights we take as a corporation. In 2009 ECC personnel (just over 500) took 8,325 total flights, flying 13,138,977 miles, becoming responsible for putting 2,425 tons of CO₂ into the atmosphere. The concept is to donate money to certified carbon offsetting projects to reach a carbon-neutral status. The idea of “Reduce what you can, offset what you can not” is what this initiative is all about. With our IT department, and use of our Web-based systems, we are working hard to have more “face time” with little or no travel time by utilizing tele-conferences, webcasts and webinars instead of flying people to meet and do their work.
- 2) Annually plant at least 1 tree per ECC office, currently 14 offices. Overall, the concept is to plant trees every year, with the goal to cumulatively increase the number of trees planted to sequester CO₂ from our office operations. We can track CO₂ sequestered metrics and reduced Carbon Footprints along with dollars provided to local communities to stimulate local economies. This is very important during times of budget shortfalls for local parks and enabling to maintain park tree plantings, replacements, and upkeep. Wouldn't it be nice if we could make our goal to plant one tree for every ECC employee each year? With reforestation efforts in Colorado for the Hayden burn area, this could be feasible.
- 3) Draft a chapter for ECC's Project Management Guide on how to green project sites. This will include a general checklist and a LEED checklist, and become part of our Environment, Safety, and Quality surveillance program to document the success of green program implementation. It also will include other information on innovative ideas and procedures our PMs generate as they complete their projects. All ECC PMs and their projects been instructed to have a reduce, reuse, and recycle mentality that will reduce the amount of waste generated, and increase the amount of reuse and recycling. “Green” concepts are being written into ECC's proposals and work plans.

- 4) Increase office efficiency and computer recycling. Our goal is to either donate or recycle all of our outdated and used computers, printers, faxes, phones, and all business electronics without sending anything to a landfill. Also, for 2010 we are improving our office efficiency and searching out alternate solar/wind/hydro power where applicable. Each ECC office has a recycling program; our larger offices have a comprehensive recycling programs, where nearly all wastes can be commingled and recycled.

The EGT and ECC have had success in greening our work and our lives, for example some of the articles in the *News Flash* in 2010 have been:

- Composting - ECC employees share their stories
- Paul Saborwhal (Chairman of ECC) installs 6.9 kW solar system for 90% of his energy needs
- Stanley Wojinski – purchased a “clean diesel” car with fewer emissions than a gas combustion engine
- Driving Green – Nora Nilles research and purchase of a Nissan Altima hybrid car for \$13,637 under MSRP (ECC provides a \$2,000 hybrid rebate program)
- Reuse of excess pallets at Moody AFB – Joseph Cronk’s weekend avocation

Additionally, ECC through the EGT will pay for its employees to take advantage of a junk mail reduction service -

<http://www.41pounds.org/>. Did you know the average American adult receives about 41 pounds of junk mail each year? When you think of all the paper and all the gas for delivery and all the space in the landfill; all the materials and energy in general that go into the life-cycle of this junk mail, the impact is astounding. The www.41pounds.org service stops 80-95% of unwanted catalogs and junk mail for you by contacting dozens of companies on your behalf to STOP YOUR JUNK MAIL and PROTECT THE ENVIRONMENT.

Just think, this is the volunteer work of only 12 individuals in a company of just over 500 employees. What can you do? A lot, read and learn about the way you can contribute to the “greening” of you company. I have access to a wealth of resources and the EGT to back me up. CHWMS HAZARDOUS WASTE REGULATORY UPDATE

FEDERAL AND STATE ACTIONS APPLICABLE TO COLORADO

The Environmental Protection Agency proposed to delete from the National Priorities List approximately 2,500 acres at Rocky Mountain Arsenal near Denver. EPA and CDPHE determined that all required cleanup activities are complete in the operable units at the Arsenal proposed for deletion. (75 Fed. Reg. 34,405).

Gov. Bill Ritter signed H.B. 1348 designed to increase regulatory oversight of uranium mills in the state by requiring operators of uranium mills to comply with all clean up orders before new permits for expansion or restructuring of operations are processed. Under current law, uranium processing facilities must have a license issued by the CDPHE to receive, possess, use, transfer, or acquire most radioactive materials.

Gov. Bill Ritter signed S.B. 177 creating a property tax incentive to promote biomass energy development. For purposes of property taxation, biomass energy facilities are to be valued in the same manner as wind and solar energy facilities, using the income approach, the bill states. A purpose of the law is to encourage recycling of beetle-kill timber to develop green energy.

Officials in Garfield County have approved a land lease for a private solar power facility in which local utility customers can purchase an ownership stake when they buy electricity. The Board of County Commissioners May 17th approved a long-term lease on 3.4 acres of county airport land for the Clean Energy Collective, a project touted as the first of its kind in the nation. The collective also received conceptual approval from Eagle County for a similar solar array on a seven acre site near Wolcott and a two acre site in Snowmass Village.

Coors Brewing Co. and other companies that contributed waste materials to the Lowry Landfill superfund site have agreed to pay \$1.1 million in the settlement of a natural resource damages case with the state of Colorado, according to a proposed consent decree filed in federal court *Colorado v. Molson Coors Brewing Co.*, D. Colo., No. 10-CV-1303. The landfill, listed on the National Priorities List, was once a major landfill for numerous Colorado companies. Money from the settlement will be used by Colorado to restore natural resources and compensate for contamination of groundwater at the 508-acre site.
